

The game has started. Two dinosaurs are about to battle! Use the mini pixel pic to build the dinos by precisely pixeling each block.




Freeplay




Pixel Palette

You'll need these colours to complete the pixel pictures in this book. Line up your pencils, and then start building blocks by colouring in the pixel squares.


Try making lighter or darker tones of each colour by pressing softer or harder with your pencils.

If you're feeling adventurous you could choose your own colours to pixel in the different dinos.








TYRANNOSARUS VS TRICERATOPS








It might be smaller than its cousin, Tyrannosaurus, but you wouldn't want to say 'Allo to Allosaurus (unless you speak dinosaur,






ALLOSAURUS vs STEGOSAURUS






This big-headed, long-toothed, bumpy dino looks pretty goofy, but don't make the mistake of laughing at it. It's very sensitive.










CERATOSAURUS vs DIPLODOCUS











This meat-eating dinosaur is like a turkey. Except it has a longer tail. And it's usually angry. And it has really sharp teeth. And you probably wouldn't want to eat it with roast potatoes. Velociraptor would usually attack smaller dinosaurs and mammals, but hunger or stupidity could make it take on something larger.



If Velociraptor is like a turkey, then Protoceratops is like a pig. With a beak. This small-sized dinosaur doesn't have much in common with its successor Triceratops, which is unfortunate. The best defence this little piggy has is in numbers. By staying in the herd, it might stand a chance.







VELOCIRAPTOR VS PROTOCERATOPS






















If you thought Tyrannosaurus was scary, get ready to run because here comes Giganotosaurus. With a skull bigger than a human, Giganotosaurus outweighs Tyrannosaurus by almost 5 tonnes. With the ability to hunt in packs, Giganotosaurus was the top dino during the Early Cretaceous period.







Named for its discoverer, and not it's love of breaking wind (because there's no way of knowing that from fossils), Gastonia is an armoured, spikey, head-butting dinosaur with a dangerously strong tail.





GASTONIA vs UTAHRAPTOR


